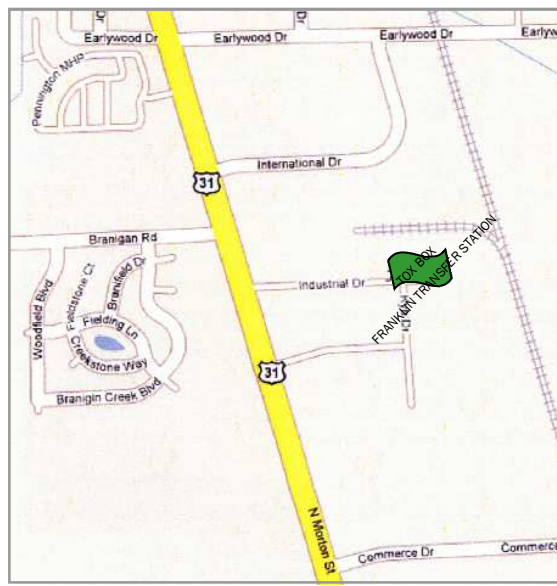

THE TOX BOX is a household hazardous waste materials collection program designed to be a safe and convenient way for Johnson County Residents to dispose of toxic materials. The program is free to Johnson County residents with the exception of Latex paint disposal. That fee is \$1.50/gal or \$1.00/qt.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE MATERIALS

Many common products used around your home like paints, pesticides, and polishes, batteries, brake fluid and bathroom cleaners, contain chemicals that are classified as



Household Hazardous Waste or HHW. If it is flammable, explosive, toxic enough to make your skin or eyes burn, or if it's fumes make you or your family choke or feel sick, then it is a hazardous product. Those products can hurt you, your family and the environment.

So, what should you do with the products stored under your kitchen and bathroom sinks, closets, basements, or in the garage that you no longer use? Don't pour it down the drain, a storm sewer or on the ground and don't put it in your trash! Eventually those chemicals end up back in a water supply somewhere.

To dispose of hazardous products, bring the materials, in their original containers to the **TOX BOX**. Trained personnel will collect the materials and a hazardous waste management company will then take the materials and dispose of the items using Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved guidelines. You will be asked to show proof of residency.

Most Hazardous Waste will be accepted at the site, although certain volatile materials will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Items such as radioactive materials, bio-medical wastes and explosives will not be accepted.

WHAT ABOUT LATEX PAINT? Once LATEX paint (also labeled acrylic or water-based paint) is completely dried out, it can be disposed of with your regular trash. Never throw away paint that is still in a liquid form.



FOLLOW THESE SIMPLE STEPS TO DRY OUT LATEX PAINT:

1. Remove the lid.
2. Add sand or kitty litter to the paint until there are equal parts absorbent and paint. Stir, and leave in a dry, well-ventilated area such as a porch or garage to completely dry out.
3. Put out with your regular trash. Make sure to leave the lid off so that your trash hauler knows there is no liquid left in the can.

TIP: *If you are drying out a paint container that is greater than half full, line a sturdy cardboard box with a garbage bag. Cover the bottom of liner with sand or kitty litter. Carefully pour the paint in the box. Then cover the paint with more sand or kitty litter. Allow the paint to dry and dispose of it with your regular trash.*
